OZCF Collects Donations for Iran Earthquake Relief

The massive earthquake that hit Bam on Friday December 26th has destroyed the ancient Silk Road city of Bam in southeast Iran. Over 80% of Bam, a popular tourist spot with a historic citadel and other centuries-old buildings, was levelled. This disastrous event has killed over 35,000 people, injured 30,000, and left 10,000 homeless. It is feared that these figures could be higher.

Along with humanitarian aid coming from all directions, OZCF has sent out a cheque of \$5,000.00 which was collected within 24hours.

Ontario Zoroastrians Celebrate 3000 Years of Zoroastrian Culture

To commemorate the year 2003 as the 3000th anniversary of Zoroastrian culture as declared by UNESCO, Zarathushtis of Ontario presented an evening showcasing Zoroastrianism to a packed 530 seat capacity audience at Markham Theatre in Toronto on Friday November 28, 2003. This evening, sponsored by the ZSO was put together with the combined effort of 132 individuals of all ages. The show's director Ervad Kerman Katrak and Producer Roshan Davar would like to thank this mile long list of dedicated individuals without whom this success would not have been possible. The event was gracefully attended by Honourable Mr. Derek Lee, MP from Scarborough Rouge River and Honourable Mr. Jim Karygiannis, M.P from Scarborough-Agincourt.

More than 100 performers, ranging from ages 4 to 85 gave their best performances with an array of songs, dances, and skits based on Prophet Zarathushtra's teachings.

Some of the highlights of the 17 items included:

Ava-ye-javedan (the eternal sound) A professional group of musicians performing melodies of "Radif" of Iranian Classical Music from "Avaz-e Dashti" in a traditional structure with a contemporary approach

The Zardushtin Umudi, (Silk Road Chamber Orchestra of ancient, modern folklore music from Zoroastrian times) and the "Sari Gelin" Dance, Tabriz Azerbaijanian-Music and Dance Ensemble

Very small children singing "I am proud to be a Zarathushti", "Who made the sky" and other religious songs

The unique philosophy and message of Zarathushtra based on a Question and Answer format

The recitation of "The word of Zarathushtra" from the Gathas by 15 priests of varying ages dressed in their white priestly attire

The Narration of King Cyrus of Persia: Bringing the Zoroastrian Doctrine to Life

The well received skit on how Zarathushtis were welcomed on the Indian soil in Sanjan

There were displays of Zarathushti artifacts, a continuous running of a video in the lobby on "Zoroastrians", a power point presentation on "Who were the Zoroastrians" depicting famous Iranian and Parsi Zarathushtis, land mark achievements, some history, archeological findings.

An attractive program booklet with a specially prepared booklet "Zoroastrian Religion, Beliefs, Culture and Ceremonies" marked the occasion.

The audience also had a taste of typical Zoroastrian snacks

Zoroastrian Children's Day - a historic event of epic proportions

Zoroastrian Children's Day was held on Sunday November 23rd 2003 at Albless Baug in Bombay. This mega event was the brainchild of Kyoshi Shihan Vispy Kapadiawho approached ZOSTA with this idea. The Zoroastrian Student Teacher Association, in its 25th year, was originally formed to bring students of various schools of Mumbai for the purpose of encouraging cultural progress, research in the doctrines of Zoroastrianism and recognize academic achievements.

The Children's Day was a runaway success congregating over 900 Zoroastrian students from 35 schools. While a galaxy of priests and scholars shared gems of wisdom, comedians like Dinyar Contractor did humorous skits and plays with children. The evening reached its zenith with 100 children dancing with the famous Shiamak Davar electrifying the stage with positive energy.

There was no entrance charge for this event. Sumptuous meals were served during the 8 hour long event. Lavish gifts were given to every child and 25 buses were hired to safely ferry the children to and from even the remotest part of the city. All this was done with no handouts, no donations from within nor from overseas.

It was a day to be remembered by all. The hard work by a band of volunteers was truly commendable. Due to the tremendous success, the organizers have been requested to make this an annual event.



Medics in Sri Lanka

"Home is where the heart is" and "charity begins at home." Well Jasmine Jasavala, once again, reminds us that these adages are still applicable in this day and age. Her charity is certainly coming from the heart and she is reminding us that Parsees have long been known for their charitable works.

Jasmine Jasavala has recently returned from Sri Lanka where she volunteered to teach emergency medical techniques and help reconstruct a school in one of the villages.

Once again, City TV's Gord Martineau chronicled the mission. Last year Jasmine went on a similar mission to Cambodia.

These trips to poorer third world villages are particularly gratifying when witnessing the coming together of two people from opposite sides of the warring factions that exist in Sri Lanka.

"There was one fellow from the Sri Lankan Army and we paired him up with one of the Tamil medics. Right there was the peace process being demonstrated and by the end of the session they were exchanging addresses with each other."

"..... We live in the part of the world where one only reads about it in the local newspaper and T.V. coverage. To actually stand among the ruins is a whole different ball game. I keep thanking my lucky stars that I have had the opportunity to do this now."

Jasmine would like to see this project expand and include medics from all over the world who would be willing to participate and maybe sponsor a village or city in the third world.

Of course it would be impossible for a Parsee to visit any part of India and not visit a place of worship! While in Colombo Jasmine visited an atash dadgha built in 1927.

There, she met with former Torontonians, Soli and Dina Panthakee, who hold jashans once a month for the 40 Parsees living in and around Colombo.

As a point of interest, the Finance Minister also happens to be a Parsee-a member of the very influential Choksey family.

Farishteh has also received a Scholarship from University of Toronto where she is pursuing her career in teaching Music. Well done!

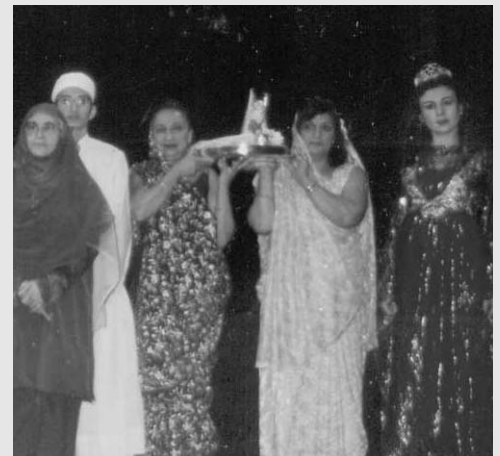
Gratitude
